Best Practices Become a Regional Discussion

When Chesterfield County decided to examine best practices in middle school education as a key initiative this school year, their Director of Middle Schools reached out to Bridging Richmond, an emerging cradle to career partnership that spans nine jurisdictions, to assist in making this a regional discussion. The goal of the regional collaborative effort is to jointly research, share, plan and ultimately implement best practices for middle school education. Through collaborative planning, a “middle school summit was held on the campus of VCU on July 31st, bringing together approximately 90 administrators, curriculum specialists, technology directors, and central office personnel to examine our needs and shape a vision for middle school education in the area. A second summit, to be held on October 24th at the Math/Science Innovation Center in Richmond, will build on the work of the first summit, bringing together a planned 175 middle school educators, university personnel, and interested community partners to build on the work of the first summit. The work will continue throughout the school year, with plans to share the data produced and researched-based best practices for middle school education for use by all surrounding districts. VMSA Conference Inspires College in Six Program in Roanoke County

Principal Tammy Newcomb attended last year's VMSA Fall Conference at JMU and went away inspired to start a new program for her students at William Byrd Middle School in Roanoke County. Borrowing from the success of a similar program in Loudoun County, Newcomb worked with her leadership team to develop and implement a "College in Six" program. The College in Six Program is based on research that suggests that middle schools need to start preparing students as early as sixth grade for post-secondary education. The William Byrd plan will include specific activities at each grade level, beginning with a visit to a college campus for all sixth graders. Seventh graders and their families will have the opportunity to hear directly from college officials about admissions requirements and financial aid. Eighth grade students will write a personal statement to start them thinking about college applications and also participate in a college fair. The program has met with such enthusiasm that it has spread to all five Roanoke County middle schools.

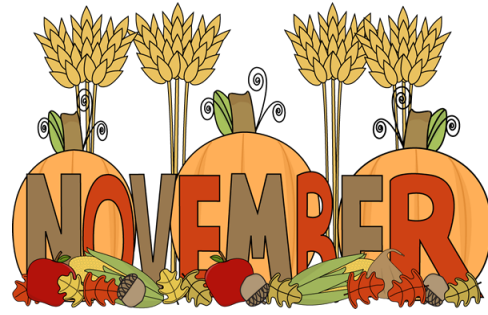
